I received my Novice ticket in 1964, and moved into the world of tubes with glowing filaments, plate transformers and receivers weighing 30 pounds and more. My modified WWII radios put out enough heat to keep my bedroom shack warm in the winter.

Later, as an adult with a family, there was a period in my life when I realized that I hadn't turned on my Kenwood TS-430 transceiver for nearly a year. I rationalized that I could use the money since the budget was tight, and sold it at a hamfest. My shack was bare. Then I was invited to attend a QRP ham radio club and won a small 5-watt transceiver kit in a raffle. I hadn't soldered any circuits in nearly 30 years, but suddenly ham radio was fun again and I was building a radio for the first time since my novice days. A 30 meter dipole in the attic provided plenty of contacts during the last sunspot cycle.

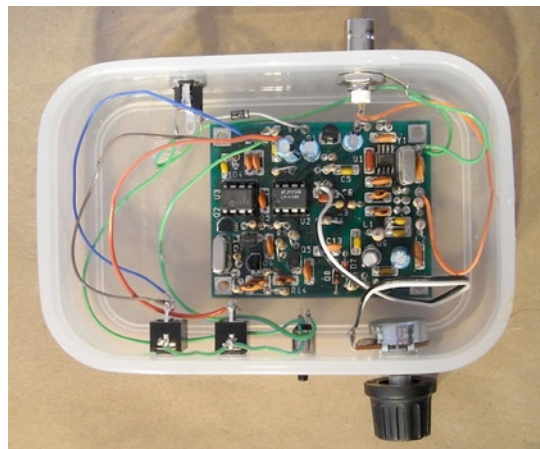
Today, several of my transceivers are small enough to fit inside of an Altoids case and run for hours off of a 9v battery. The price of radios has also changed -- for the better.

As a 13-year-old, I could only dream while looking at the QST magazine ads. Now the radios I reach for the most cost \$55 and \$27, respectively, and the kits were assembled over a few evenings.

Today, there are more ham radio kits available than ever before; everything from small \$17 electronic keyers, to a 100 watt all-band transceiver that rivals the best from the traditional manufacturers. Kits are available in single-band, multi-band multimode or CW only, requiring only a small DC power supply. I can email the actual designer of the kit with my questions and receive help with any troubleshooting.

QRP International Amateur Radio Club is the largest club around with about 13,000 members. Their website: www.qrparci.org has links to news, clubs, kits, small parts, and more.

So when the winter gales are and the snow starts to drift, I will be snug in the ham shack soldering and building some inexpensive projects, just for the fun of the game.

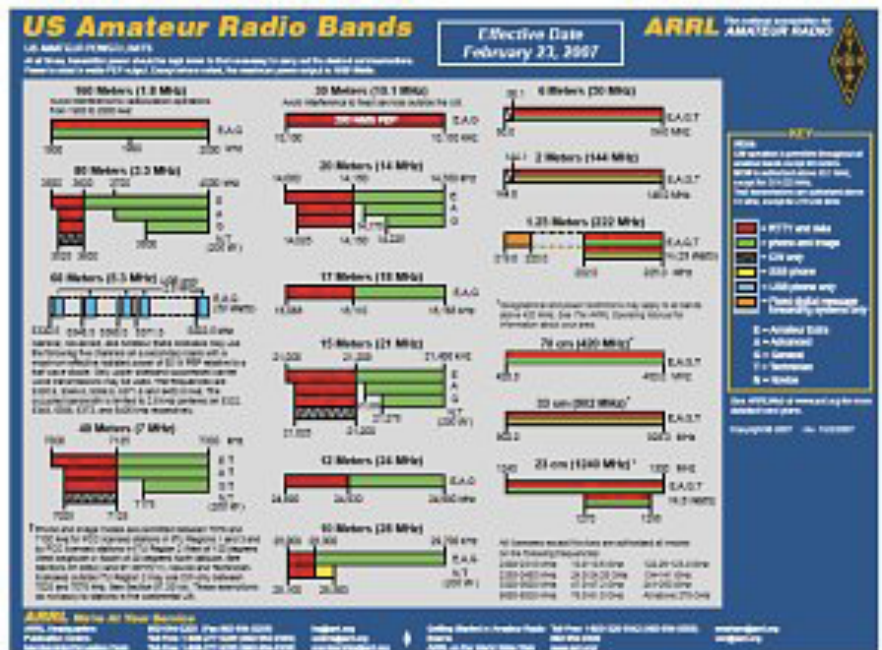

Hams Provide Safety Support to Higginsville, MO, Run-Walk Event

About 15 area amateur radio operators provided logistical support to the annual Higginsville, MO, October Run-Walk event to raise funds for the local heat and hunger fund.

The event, held during our country fair weekend, has become very popular for runners in this area. Entry fees, corporate and individual donations, raised about \$2000 for the fund.

The run is four miles long, starting at downtown Higginsville then two miles north to our Confederate Park, around the park, then back to downtown. Because the main street of Higginsville, MO is also state business route 13, it cannot be shut down entirely.

The state mandates that one lane of Route 13 be open at all

times for large truck traffic.

Auto traffic were directed to a side street but trucks had to use Main Street to avoid unwanted tree trimming on the side streets. Area ham operators stationed

themselves at each intersection to guide traffic across Main Street when runners cleared the intersection and to guide the traffic one way at a time over the two-mile stretch.

As your part in this audit is implemented we will be able to build a new electronic distribution process, possibly expanding the existing list server at GRACELAND. EDU, which has been offered to us again through the kind assistance of Jim Jones at GU. If that server does not work out for us for any reason, we will pursue a different but similar self managing platform to support our Internet communication needs.

WØSHQ 2 Meter Repeaters

WØSHQ FCC Trustee Robin Cross WØFEN and Executive Director Doug Shaw recently submitted the annual updates required by the Iowa (IaRC) and Missouri Repeater Councils. Thanks to Jon Barney AAØOS, primary sysop for WØSHQ/R in Lamoni, for verifying operational parameters, including the tower V&H coordinates (using a GPS device), required to complete the update for the IaRC. The Lamoni repeater has not been in the last several editions of the ARRL Repeater Directory but should reappear in the 2010-2011 edition.

The Lamoni WØSHQ 2 Meter FM 146.73(-) repeater is operated by the Lamoni Amateur Radio Association (LARA), a chapter of the Association of Saints Church Radio Amateurs (ASCRA, www.ascra.org).

The repeater transmit antenna extends to 90 feet on a 70 foot tower located between the homes of Jon Barney AAØOS and Tony Crandall KØISA, LARA President.

Internet VoIP access to the repeater is served by a dedicated EchoLink node, WØYO-R (#127318) operated by the Graceland University Amateur Radio Club (also an ASCRA chapter) in Lamoni. The WØYO Trustee is Prof. Steve Murdock NØZY.
