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HF Beacons Useful

Have you listened to the international beacon signals? I find them interesting to show propagation conditions even though I rarely call a DX station.

The beacons transmit on the 20 through 10M bands and are all on the same frequency in each band. Eighteen beacons spaced world-wide transmit, each in their own 10 second segment of a three minute period. In that ten seconds they send their call at 22 wpm followed by four one-second dashes. The call and first dash is transmitted at 100 watts. The other dashes follow at 10 watts, 1 watt and 100 milliwatts respectively. The next beacon then begins sending from its location, etc.

Perhaps it sounds too much like work to copy the cw and figure out where the station is located? It all has been made easy. Two tools are available which make beacon listening easy and fun.

The first is a map for your wall with LED lights to show where the station you are hearing is located. This map is available as a MFJ-890. (MFJ Enterprises)

If you don't want to spend \$100 for the MFJ-890 and if you have a Windows computer in your shack you can do it all at no cost.

A nice program called BeaconTrack by DL1SP is available free, displaying a map of the world and the locations of each beacon. It synchronizes with your computer clock and shows which beacon is transmitting at a particular time. You will want to set your computer clock exactly and there is another nice free program to do that via WWV on the internet.

To print the beacon schedule go to http://www.ncdxf.org/, click on beacons and then beacon transmission schedule. To get the map display go to: http://www.dl1sp.de/ and download the BeaconTrack software. To synchronize your computer clock with WWV download "NistTime" from http://home.socal.rr.com/atsoftware/. After down-loading, an icon will appear on your desktop for setting your computer clock.

You can listen for the beacons on 14.100, 18.110, 21.150, 24.930 and 28.200 Mhz.

I have enjoyed watching HF propagation change with time and frequency. Sometimes 10 Meters will seem quiet but a beacon will come in strong from Madeira near the Azores or Venezuela SA. I usually listen to the beacons before our Sunday 20M net to see if our ASCRA stations in England or Australia might be coming in.

What Can We Do To Improve ASCRA?

Recently I was surprised by a critical comment made to another party about ASCRA and thought there was some truth in what had been said.

This article is intended to let the members understand:

- 1. How we are organized and why a few members continue to be involved as directors and officers.
- 2. Comments made on the Sunday net are dominated by personal and church activity in contrast to technical ham discussions about equipment and operational matters.
- 3. Another purpose is to open discussion about ASCRA and see if we can figure out how to improve it.

ASCRA has 12 directors. Six are elected every year by the members and the 12 directors gather in April for an annual business meeting to care for a budget and other matters as necessary.

Members can nominate up to 6 members to serve as directors and the membership votes based on what they know about the individuals. In many cases the members do not know any of the candidates. As directors are expected to travel to Independence for the annual business meeting, they usually don't know anyone they can nominate.

This is in contrast to the "GROUP OF INVOLVED MEMBERS" that have become known to each other and share a social relationship with maybe 30-50 other members.

I'll give an example of how things happen.

When a little known ASCRA member nominates him or her self, probably at quite a distance from Independence, that person is usually not well known by other ASCRA members. They do not receive enough votes to become a director. Those better known by members will receive the most votes.

This almost eliminates any nominee that:

- 1. Does not live near Independence.
- 2. Has not participated on the 20M net.
- 3. Has not attended the general meetings during conference.

These events are the way members have become acquainted with enough members to become the existing directors.

Comments about the net.....

When we gather on the 20M net each Sunday, we are checking on the status of our friends. Each person chooses to talk about whatever they wish. When we have questions, we get back on those subjects. It turns out Church activities are a dominant subject and the health of the family.

Naturally there are frequent questions about signal quality and antenna construction plans, but this is not the

primary subject matter. If we want to change what we talk about, we can, but most of us don't feel uncomfortable talking about almost anything with our friends.

About the organization.....

Those given the responsibility of being directors have always been dedicated to the continuation of ASCRA into the future.

Many years ago Terry, W6LMJ, told us, "Organizations will die unless the membership feels ownership in the organization". We have tried desperately to find projects and programs that would encourage membership participation, including writing articles for the In-Service. Years ago when we provided communications with La Buena Fe, we all identified with that essential service.

This quest for noble endeavers continues and needs input anytime from the members to meet this goal.

Now for some of my feelings about the organization.......

ASCRA members are a kind of brotherhood in the church. These ASCRA friends are the salt of the earth so to speak and the relationships are on a higher level than any other friends I have.

Directors dealing with each other in behalf of ASCRA has been with great sensitivity and great respect for each other, in ways I never expected.

I attribute this to ASCRA being a Church member organization.

That is the value of the organization to me, but I do not feel being involved with ASCRA is a calling.

Back to needed improvements.....

Can you think how we can direct ASCRA in a better way?

Michael, KGØXU, suggested adding personal information about candidates to the ballot. This will allow members to be better acquainted with the candidates. This will probably be discussed in the next business meeting.

In the February In-Service, Michael, KGØXU encouraged any local members or someone visiting in Independence to give

him a call to arrange to operate WØSHQ. His office phone in the Temple is 833-1000 X2284 (or 800-825-2806 X2284) his home phone is 816-252-4451.

Robin, WØFEN, has been traveling to Independence regularly to operate the ASCRA station in the Auditorium on the Sunday 20M net which meets at 3:30PM local time. You may also choose to contact him at 816-246-7330.

The "Search for Extra Terrestrial Intelligence" program was brought to the attention of ASCRA members to provide another technically interesting volunteer effort that ASCRA members could participate in with their PC's. After doing some reading which stirred their interest, some continue to enjoy their participation in SETI.

E-MAIL is another way of communication for those who no longer operate radio equipment. The In-Service has several E-MAIL addresses. There is also an ASCRA web page

where members can register their addresses. This is another way to get to know more of the members.

Can you to get more involved in ASCRA? Please put a higher priority on this challenge.

ASCRA Journey - Part 2

In the August 2002 issue of *In Service* I shared some thoughts on where we have been as an organization and issued the challenge to think about where we want to go in the future. I suggested that we are primarily a fellowship association, which is the first of our purposes. In fact, this is what has held us together despite the lack of other activities such as those ASCRA participated in during its early years of organization.

In that same issue of *In Service*, the cover story was about the success of the class at SPEC in Lamoni, Iowa. Steven Holm joined the ranks of amateur radio and of ASCRA as KCØNVX. This is an activity that the members of ASCRA can be proud of and assist with, either through their time or their contributions. I suspect that many of our members are involved in their local clubs doing this and making their contributions locally. This is as it should be.

Is there more that we can do? Should we do more? With the limitations of time and proximity what activities should ASCRA engage in where all its members can participate? Perhaps if we look at the six purposes as outlined in our Articles of Incorporation and our Bylaws we could come up with some ideas. Generally they have to do with the following themes:

Fellowship
Operate to assist society/government
Operate to assist the church/charity
Education
Research
Maintain the Association

In this article I will cover the first three purposes and use a future article to cover the last three and make some conclusions.

Purpose 1 - To establish, maintain, support, and operate an association of persons commonly interested in amateur radio communication. As I said previously - we do this really well. We have been an association for over 25 years. Nets are a practical expression in the amateur community for those with common interests and have been a major way for us to communicate with each other over the years. In part 1 of this article Terry Redding, W6LMJ, suggested that we figure out how many years or the actual number of times we have met in our Sunday fellowship net and develop and participate in a special event commemorating our association. I think that's a great idea!

Purpose 2 - To legally utilize communication skills and the licenses granted to service our community and, in this way, lessen the burden of government. I believe it was the intent of those who directed ASCRA in the early years that we be actively engaged and visible in our communities, particularly Independence, Missouri, in support of organizations such as RACES and ARES. In fact, ASCRA was so committed to this idea that a subsidiary organization was created called EARS - Emergency Amateur Radio System. The repeaters were put in place to be a major presence in Independence and the surrounding area. Some of the "Old Timers" could perhaps write an article on this.

For many of us, we are involved in this activity in our local communities as well. Some might participate in region-wide groups during times of disaster.

Purpose 3 - To legally utilize communication skills and the licenses granted to service any religious and charitable organization and in this way lessen human suffering. Years ago ASCRA participated in linking via amateur radio autopatch several appointees of the church in Mexico and South America with President W. Wallace Smith during a general

conference business session. What a wonderful way to show our skills and abilities by assisting in this kind of process. With the advent of cell phones and the internet, our services in this regard are not as necessary as they once might have been. Yet there is still much that we could do on behalf of service to our church.

How many of you are involved with the Red Cross or other charitable organizations when they sponsor events? The Central Stakes Chapter of ASCRA, many years ago, assisted a local organization for battered women, which sponsored a walk to raise money and awareness for their organization. I know of two local members who participate in the MS-150 bike-a-thon as either participants or as radio support personnel.

Next time I will talk about the other purposes of ASCRA and ask some important questions to get us thinking about the unique issues we face today and how our Association can engage them. I encourage your thoughts in response to this series of articles. Let's share our ideas together as we begin to build and shape a new vision for ASCRA.
